Camp with Ngururrpa Rangers to Yagga Yagga

Sarah from Camera Story was invited out to Yagga Yagga to help teach the Ngururrpa Rangers how to document their work on country using photography and video.

Clare from EPWA supported the workshop. The women learnt how to take images, record sound, interview each other and edit videos using IPADS and DSLR cameras. We discussed the different kind of stories which can be recorded and considerations when sharing stories. Cultural knowledge and stories can be recorded to share with young women.

We also spoke about the importance of documenting stories to share the 'caring for country' work the rangers do.

Kathryn, Monica and Gina led the trip and we visited lots of places near Yagga Yagga. The older women Sadie and Maree shared stories of important Country.

Yagga Yagga is about 87 kms from Balgo and takes about two hours travel on an unsealed road.

Recording Stories

The women learnt how to interview each other about their country and their work as rangers.

Newly acquired skills:

- Microphone set up
- Basic sound recording
- Checking sound levels
- Asking interview questions

The women had lots of opportunity to practice talking in front of the camera and got more confident each time.

This is a group photograph visiting caves near Yagga Yagga. The caves are an important culture site, home to rock art. Everyone retuned to Balgo relaxed after a few days in the bush.

The women learnt how to use DSLR cameras and iPads to capture video. They explored framing, composition and portrait and landscape photography.

Kathyrn manages the Op Shop and also works with EPWA as a local enteprise facilitator leading women to use their skills in the arts and bush medicine and cooking.

Kathyrn is also on the leadership team for the Ngururrpa rangers.

Sarah from Camera Story is working with artists at Piriwa and senior artistis at Waryirti Art Cente to create a mural using paint and photography. This trip we planned what kind of images would be used on the sea container and also what stories could be represented on the art mural and which artisits wanted to contribute to the project.
